# Aide-Memoire: NCEA Level 1 trends

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## Purpose

- 1. This aide memoire is in response to your request for information about the longitudinal trends in NCEA Level 1 uptake by students, including those who did not engage in a full NCEA Level 1 programme. It is supplementary to the Briefing Note *Provisional 2023 Enrolment-based NCEA and University Entrance National Attainment Statistics* [OC00548 refers].
- 2. In March, NZQA and the Ministry of Education will be providing you with an analysis of those students who have not engaged in a full NCEA Level 1 programme in 2023 and have returned to school in 2024 and those who have left.
- 3. NZQA proposes to proactively release this briefing as part of the next publication of documents.

### Background

- 4. Engagement in NCEA Level 1 is optional. NCEA Change Programme Change 7 Keep NCEA Level 1 optional was a result of discussions whether NCEA Level 1 should be retained or not.
- Increasing numbers of schools are not offering a full Level 1 assessment programme, i.e. students are not being entered in and assessed against sufficient credits to achieve an NCEA Level 1. As a result, attainment of NCEA Level 1 by Year 11 students has been trending downwards for several years.
- 6. Each year there are students at secondary school who undertake courses which are not assessed using standards administered by NZQA such as Accelerated Christian Education, Cambridge International, or International Baccalaureate.

#### Discussion

7. The following table shows the final results for Year 11 NCEA Level 1 by enrolment-based measure. The 2023 results are provisional.

8. Of the 68,837 Year 11 students enrolled in a school in 2023, 51,643 (75%) are deemed 'participants' in NCEA Level 1, i.e. they were assessed in 80 Level 1 or above credits. The table below shows the rate of 'participating' Year 11s over the last 10 years. There has been a steady decrease in the proportion of participating Year 11 students since 2014. The proportion of students participating has declined by 1.1% between 2022 and 2023.


9. The Year 11 attainment rate in NCEA Level 1 for 'participating' students has also declined over the last 10 years. The table below shows the attainment rate for the subset of Year 11 students who were 'participants'.

- 10. Of the 68,837 Year 11 students enrolled in 2023, there were 17,194 (25.0%) students who were deemed 'non-participants', i.e. they were assessed for fewer credits than would be required to achieve NCEA Level 1.
- The 17,194 non-participants can be broken down as follows: 11.

12. If Te Aho o Te Kura Pounamu (1,468 non-participating Year 11 students) and Home Education (786 non-participating students) are removed from the 17,194 non-participants, the 30 schools with the largest Year 11 cohorts of non-participating students are as follows:

- 13. This chart shows there are a variety of schools whose students are 'non-participants' in NCEA Level 1. Many of these schools enrol students who are on pathways to alternative qualifications to NCEA, such as Accelerated Christian Education, Cambridge International or the International Baccalaureate. Others will be running programmes that prepare their students for NCEA Level 2 over two years and/or may be running their own Diploma courses at Level 1. There is also Kingslea, a specialist school where NCEA may not be the target qualification for all their students.
- 14. In March, NZQA and the Ministry of Education will be providing you with an analysis of those students who have not engaged in a full NCEA Level 1 programme in 2023 and have returned to school in 2024 and those who have left.
- 15. The following table shows a breakdown into broad counts of credits assessed for the 11,547 non-participant student that were assessed for at least 1 level 1 or above credit in 2023.

16. The following table shows the proportion of the 11,547 non-participant students assessed in one or more Level 1 or above credits by subject down to and including 1% of these students.

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17. The 32 subjects are from a list of 65 subjects assessed for these students in total and only includes subjects based on Achievement Standards.

#### Survey of schools about their intentions with NCEA Level 1 in 2024

18. In September 2023, we surveyed schools and kura about their intentions with NCEA Level 1 to assist us to better support them in the first year of implementation of the new NCEA level 1 subjects in 2024.

19. Responses to the question 'Is attaining NCEA Level 1 the intended assessment outcome for the majority of their Year 11 learners/ākonga?'

- Based on previous information we hold, we estimate that half the schools who
  responded 'No' to this question are already not offering a full Level 1 assessment
  programme in 2023.
- In most regions, between 70% and 90% of respondent schools answered Yes. The regions with the lowest rates of responding 'Yes' were Auckland (53%) and Southland (50%).
- Schools with fewer socio-economic barriers to achievement had the lowest rates of responding 'Yes' (52%).
- 20. The following table applies to Level 1 subjects derived from either the New Zealand Curriculum or Te Marautanga o Aotearoa, averaged across all subjects (within each curriculum).

Tracking Year 11 cohorts over time

- 21. NZQA tracks Year 11 cohorts over the three years of senior secondary to determine what their highest qualification outcome is at the end of three years of senior secondary schooling. Students who leave school before the end of three years of senior secondary schooling are still counted, and their highest attainment up to their departure from school is included. We publish this information each year at the end of May in our *Annual Report: NCEA, University Entrance and NZ Scholarship Data and Statistics* and companion A3 summary *Attainment by the numbers.* The 2022 A3 is attached as an appendix to this briefing.
- 22. The table below provides this information for the last five Year 11 cohorts, i.e. for 2017 Year 11s, 2018 Year 11s, 2019 Year 11s, 2020 Year 11s and 2021 Year 11s. This shows that the proportion of students leaving school with no NCEA qualification has increased slightly when looking at the last five cohorts of Year 11 students and the proportion leaving with University Entrance and NCEA Level 3 has also decreased.

23. The Ministry of Education advises that approximately 1,500 students leave school with a non-New Zealand Qualifications and Credentials Framework (NZQCF) qualification, e.g. Cambridge International. NZQA does not hold data on these students or whether the number of such students is growing.
