Official Information Act Request - Academic Dishonesty

Thank you for your request, partially transferred to NZQA from the Ministry of Education on 16 September 2025 under section 14(b)(i) of the Official Information Act 1982, for the following information:

I am writing to submit a Freedom of Information request for detailed data and statistics on the instances of academic dishonesty, including plagiarism and cheating, within New Zealand educational institutions over the past five years. Specifically, I am requesting:

- The annual number of reported cases of academic dishonesty broken down by type (e.g., plagiarism, cheating on exams, use of unauthorized materials).
- The annual number of reported cases of academic dishonesty categorized by educational level (e.g., primary, secondary, tertiary institutions).
- The outcomes of these cases (e.g., warnings, expulsions, academic penalties)
- The measures currently in place to detect and prevent academic dishonesty, including plagiarism detection software and examination protocols.
- Any assessments or reviews conducted on the effectiveness of these measures in reducing instances of academic dishonesty.

Response

Your request has been considered under the Official Information Act 1982.

NZQA has a role in secondary and tertiary education through its quality assurance and assessment functions, but the collection and reporting of data on academic dishonesty is not part of our role in the tertiary sector. We also do not hold data for primary education.

We are therefore only able to provide information related to secondary school qualifications (the National Certificates of Educational Achievement) and related assessment.

I attach the following information covered by your request:

The data provided covers the last five academic years (2020-2024). As the 2025 academic year is still underway, full-year data is not yet available.

NZQA has not undertaken any assessments or reviews of the breach process during this period, and as such, no further information is available.

Measures in place to detect breaches

Current measures in place for identifying alleged breaches are by reports from:

- 1. the Principal's Nominee who sends the report after a teacher, student, supervisor or parent raises a concern;
- 2. the Examination Centre Manager;
- 3. markers who detect:
 - a. a change in tone or handwriting within and/or between questions,

- b. work has complexity beyond the level expected
- c. content that matches known exemplars, images, compositions etc;
- 4. digital detection tools can identify the following behaviours, which increase the risk of breaches:
 - a. multiple access attempts
 - b. text dumps
 - c. concerning language
 - d. if a student has exited the platform.
