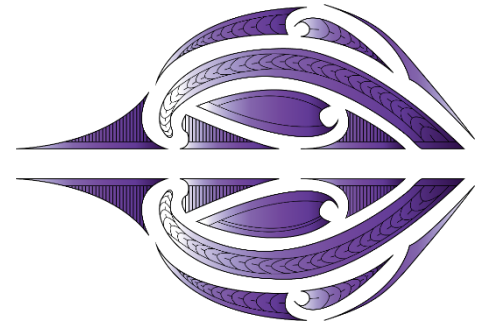

The information contained in this kete is centred around the use of Field Māori unit standards as the main assessment components of the programme being developed.

Components of a programme are units, modules, or kete of learning that make up the programme. They include projects, papers, courses, modules, practicals, and the outcomes of assessment standards.

The programme documents should include a brief description of each component:

- Overview of the content of the component
- Learning outcomes or outcomes of assessment standards
- Level and credits
- Approach to assessment of each outcome which is valid for the learner group and the learning context (not the assessment activity).
