- Source material used needs to be in English and must be attached to your final copy.

Assessment activity

You have been reading about migration and migration policy. Use relevant ideas from your reading to write an essay answering the following research questions:

- What are the main problems faced by teenage migrants as they settle into New Zealand?
- Discuss a range of possible solutions to these problems.

The academic purpose is to write a problem solution essay. This will include identification of the main problems facing teenage migrants as they settle into New Zealand and a discussion of possible solutions to these problems.

The audience you are writing for are support workers in government agencies.

To be awarded credit for this unit standard, you must:	PC
Write a minimum 800 words.	1.1
Address the topic by defining and developing the topic as required by the research questions, audience and the academic purpose. The academic purpose is to write a problem-solution essay.	1.2
Develop ideas and demonstrate a wide understanding of the topic area. Each paragraph contains a topic sentence with a different idea followed by relevant supporting details.	1.3
Ensure the text structure has clear overall progression, paragraphing and some effective use of cohesive devices.	
Ensure the text as a whole has an introduction, appropriate paragraphs and a conclusion.	
Use cohesive devices between and within paragraphs to link and develop ideas. These may include: - collocations - synonyms	
 reference e.g. pronouns connectives e.g. additives. 	
Use a formal style appropriate to the academic context. This includes:	1.4
formal and objective tone: - objective language - avoiding the use of hedging or imprecise language	
the full form of words rather than contractions.formal vocabulary:	
 specialised, precise, and clear vocabulary correct word choice and collocation e.g. language loss correct part of speech no slang or colloquialisms. 	
formal, appropriate grammar: - the use of reference, such as pronouns, to maintain clear links - the use of ellipsis and substitution to avoid repetition - nominalisation i.e. verbs turned into nouns - appropriate tense.	
 a variety of sentence structures: simple sentence compound sentence complex sentence. 	
Use correct vocabulary and grammar consistently: - vocabulary is generally accurate and used appropriately e.g. correct word choice and collocations, correct part of speech, correct prefixes, suffixes. Refer to PC 1.4 above for examples.	1.5

 grammatical forms are generally accurate and used appropriately e.g. appropriate tense, appropriate use of reference. Refer to PC 1.4 above for examples. sentences are generally accurate. Refer to PC 1.4 above for examples. 	
Integrate source material into the text to support your answer. This may include: - direct quotation - paraphrasing - summary - analytical interpretation - synthesis informed judgement.	1.6
Appropriately acknowledge source material within the text. This could include: – in-text citation – sources correctly cited in a reference list at the end using APA referencing.	1.7
Proof-read and edit your work. Read through your writing using the checklist above to ensure you have met all the requirements.
