2 Definitions

Actual examples refer to actual cases from past, present, New Zealand or overseas law, or to a particular area of law or piece of legislation.

Case law refers to the collection of past legal decision written by courts and similar tribunals in the course of deciding cases, in which the law was analysed using these cases to resolve ambiguities for deciding current cases. These past decisions are called "case law", or precedent.

Concepts of law are the ideas and understandings that underpin the discipline of law. Examples include but are not limited to – tikanga Māori (customary law); human rights; freedom of the press; natural justice; negligence; contract; crime; property; privacy.

Fully developed refers to being accurate, detailed, and well researched. News media refers to factual reporting and journalistic narratives in print media, broadcast media and the Internet.

Key elements are the generally accepted components of a concept of law; for example, the elements of the concept of crime would include actus reus, mens rea, prohibition by statute.
